Harriet Jacobs (1813-97) is the only known African American woman held in bondage to have left papers testifying to her life. Jean Fagan Yellin has discovered more than 900 primary source documents, approximately 300 of which are now collected in these two volumes. With a searchable CD of the entire contents, this collection is a crucial launching point for future scholarship on Jacobs's life and times.
